CRISIS

CRISIS

From the escalation of the conflict on February 24 to the end of 2022, the Ukrainian government estimates that between 9,000 and 16,000 civilians lost their lives. More than 13 million people left their homes, including 8 million who fled to neighbouring countries and around the world. Approximately 90 per cent of displaced people are women, children, and the elderly, as men stayed behind to participate in the defense.

Intense clashes have resulted in damage to critical infrastructure, leaving hundreds of thousands of people without access to electricity or water.

Crisis-affected people need food, clean water, and shelter; essential medicines, basic health care, mental health and psychosocial support; education; and protection, especially for displaced women and children.

APPEAL

The Humanitarian Coalition ran a joint appeal for Ukraine from February 28 – March 20, 2022, raising a collective sum of more than \$12 million.

Canadian businesses, schools and individuals ran fundraisers, and media partners stepped up to promote the campaign.

Support from across the ocean came in the form of a Britbox Special - "Concert for Ukraine" - featuring Ed Sheeran, Camila Cabello & Snow Patrol. The show directed Canadian donations to the Humanitarian Coalition.

RESPONSE

Humanitarian Coalition members moved quickly to respond to the emergency needs of people in transit and people in reception centres, in Ukraine and in Moldova, Romania and Poland. As the conflict evolved, ongoing displacement, damaged infrastructure including power outages, and the harsh winter weather all contributed to the need to adapt activities in order to effectively respond to the humanitarian requirements of the population. As assistance carries on into 2023, we are providing support to approximately 67,000 people.

ACTIVITIES

Our members are providing assistance to 67,000 people in Ukraine and bordering countries.

We are (or have been):



FOOD

- providing food to households and reception centres
- delivering hot meals to refugees
- ensuring that families within and outside Ukraine can buy their own food with cash or vouchers



WASH (WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE)

- distributing hygiene kits to meet the needs of families, women and babies
- restoring some basic sanitation services and clean water facilities in Ukraine



BASIC NEEDS

- ensuring safe transport and safe shelter, and distributing travel boxes with water, food, hygiene items and SIM cards to people in transit
- distributing household necessities to displaced families and reception centres
- providing multi-purpose cash grants to cover immediate needs
- facilitating access to jobs



HEALTH

- distributing medical supplies to health centres
- providing trauma and mental health support to displaced people



PROTECTION

- establishing a safe space for women and girls staffed with a social worker, psychologist, translator and other specialists
- providing information to prevent gender-based violence
- distributing emergency funds for women facing abuse for transportation, medical services, notary fees, etc.
- supporting family protection centres in Ukraine
- training authorities and service providers on refugee law and rights



EDUCATION

- working with schools outside of Ukraine to welcome refugee children who may need psychological, social, academic and language support
- equipping digital learning centre with materials and supporting teachers so high school students can continue their online education



WELCOMED IN A TIME OF WAR

"This is the first time in my life that I have left my country, Ukraine," says Olena, who fled the "noise of sirens and the pressure of missiles flying over our heads" with her children, Julia (4) and Anna (7).

Olena heard that Save the Children was supporting refugees crossing from Ukraine into Romania, and providing services through Counseling Hubs. So they went to the facility in lasi, where they received cash vouchers, social counseling, medical care and access to emergency housing.

"Every time I come to the Counseling Hub I feel safe," says Olena, "and my children do not want to leave because they feel comfortable and at ease.

"Here I feel welcomed and supported."



YOUNG LEADERS

After researching several charities, a group of students at Lord Aylmer elementary school chose to respond to the Ukraine crisis by raising funds for the Humanitarian Coalition because, they said, most of their money would go to programs.

Bella and Poppy, ages 8 and 4, decided to make and sell blue and yellow ribbons to help people affected by the conflict in Ukraine.

Bella says, "Imagine if we were in Ukraine right now. We need to do whatever we can."







When a small bomb fell close to their building, Irina* (31) and her children, Polina (8) and Dimitro (5), fled from their village in the Donetsk region in Ukraine, leaving her husband behind to join the defense.

After a long and exhausting journey of 12 days, the little family arrived at a shelter in a safer part of the country – supported by Canadian Lutheran World Relief – where they have three meals a day, heat, running water, hygiene items, mattresses and blankets.

Irina longs for the home they left behind and wants to return. But for now, she and her children will be staying with the other 100 refugees in this shelter, safe and warm.

CRISIS

The world is facing the most devastating hunger crisis in decades. Conflict, economic shocks, and weather extremes are worsening the situation. The COVID-19 pandemic interrupted supply chains and disrupted already fragile economies. Extreme climate events are forcing people from their homes, contaminating water sources, and causing crop and livestock losses. The war in Ukraine has driven food prices up globally, with a devastating impact on vulnerable populations.

By the spring of 2022:

- An all-time high of 50 million people in 46 countries were on the brink of starvation;
- After four failed rainy seasons, the Horn of Africa was experiencing its worst drought in 40 years;
- The cost of food had risen between 30 and 300% in parts of eastern Africa;
- Approximately 24% of the population of sub-Saharan Africa was undernourished.

APPEAL

Even though the hunger situation was increasingly critical, the media was barely covering the crisis and Canadians were largely unaware. Beginning on June 9, the Humanitarian Coalition began an information campaign to raise awareness of the problem.

On June 24, the Humanitarian Coalition launched a national fundraising appeal and the Government of Canada announced a \$5 million matching fund. By July 17, a total of \$10.3 million had been raised.

RESPONSE

The generosity of Canadians has enabled our members to respond to the critical needs in Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Kenya, Niger, Nigeria, South Sudan, and Somalia. These countries were identified as having millions of people at risk of famine.

Along with our in-country partners, we are providing food, water, nutritional supplements, and agricultural support. Where markets are functional, we are distributing cash grants to enable households to meet their own critical needs.

ACTIVITIES

Our members are responding to the needs of people in 8 countries in sub-Saharan Africa

We have provided or are providing:



FOOD AND NUTRITION

- a monthly food basket of maize flour, beans, cooking oil and salt for a period of four months to most vulnerable households (Kenya)
- micronutrient supplements and fortified flour for children (Ethiopia, Niger)
- iron supplements for pregnant women (Ethiopia)
- health and nutrition screening, training on maternal, infant and young child nutrition and care, treatment of Severe Acute Malnutrition in young children (Somalia, Nigeria, Democratic Republic of Congo, South Sudan, Ethiopia)
- cooking demonstrations and nutrition gardens (Nigeria)
- animal feed, livestock health services and crop seeds (Ethiopia)



CASH

 multi-purpose cash transfers or vouchers (Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, Niger, South Sudan, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria)



WASH (WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE)

- clean water and rehabilitated water sources, water trucking to settlements, and improved water storage, distribution, and management (Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia)
- · hygiene and dignity kits, and water treatment chemicals to households, along with hygiene and sanitation awareness and education (Somalia, Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia)



PROTECTION

- · child protection including awarenessraising and referrals (Central African Republic, Democratic Republic of Congo)
- gender-based violence risk mitigation as well as counselling and care for survivors (Somalia, Kenya, Democratic Republic of Congo, South Sudan)



HEALTH

- emergency health care for mothers and newborns (South Sudan, Ethiopia)
- primary health care supplies to mobile health teams (Ethiopia)
- mobile units to offer consultations, nutrition care, sexual and reproductive health services (Somalia)
- mental health and psychosocial support (Somalia, South Sudan)





"Before we received their food rations, we saw two children belonging to my neighbours almost succumb to starvation," says Nashangai Kongoman.

Nashangai and her neighbours participated in a food distribution organized by partners of **Canadian Foodgrains Bank** in Marsabit county, one of the regions worst affected by drought in Kenya.

"The nearest watering point is 6 km away from my home," she says. "Water is scarce. Our children suffer and sometimes lack food due to water shortage."

When Nashangai arrived home with her food, her children danced around her. After two days of only one meal, today they would have enough to eat.

"We do not have any other hope apart from this," she says. "And I register my heartfelt gratitude."

LIKE A BABY AGAIN

When Akech's mother arrived at the Bor State Hospital in South Sudan, the 5-month-old baby had a high fever, cough, difficulty breathing and was unable to feed. She was too sick to even open her eyes.

Akech was extremely underweight and suffering from severe acute malnutrition, pneumonia and malaria.

The **Doctors of the World** staff at the clinic began treatment immediately. After 10 days, Akech had remarkably improved.

"I came to the hospital when my child was very sick and almost close to death," says Akech's mother. "And now, she looks more like a baby again."





CRISIS

Starting mid-June 2022, Pakistan experienced three times the average annual rainfall, resulting in floods throughout much of the country, with devastating results. Overall, a total of 33 million people were affected, including 16 million children. Some 1,400 people lost their lives, and 7.9 million people were displaced. More than 6 million people were in need of humanitarian assistance.

The heavy monsoon rains damaged or destroyed more than 2 million homes. Whole villages were submerged, hundreds of bridges were washed away, and 13,094 km of roads were damaged.

Even after the water receded, the impact of the flooding was widespread and will be long-lasting. For example, the loss of crops and livestock led to food insecurity and loss of income. Waterborne and other diseases were on the rise, including diarrhea, malaria, acute respiratory infections, typhoid, and cholera.

Damaged shelters usually lead to an increase in the risk of exploitation and abuse, and a critical lack of resources may have negative effects such as an increase in child marriage or child labour as people attempt to cope in whatever ways they can.

APPEAL

In response to the needs of the communities affected by the flooding, and the desire of Canadians to help, the Humanitarian Coalition launched a national fundraising appeal from September 13 to September 28, 2022. Prime Minister Justin Trudeau announced that the government would match donations. Canadians responded generously, raising more than \$16 million, including the matching grant of \$7.5 million.

RESPONSE

Humanitarian Coalition member agencies are responding to the humanitarian needs of people in Sindh, Punjab, Baluchistan and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa provinces. We are working with our partners to provide emergency food, water, shelter and health care and to ensure the safety and well-being of vulnerable people, especially women and children.

Nine members of the Humanitarian Coalition are responding in Pakistan and are providing:

- meal replacements or supplements for pregnant and lactating women
- food vouchers for families who can buy their own groceries
- therapeutic food for vulnerable people to prevent malnutrition
- nutrition awareness raising sessions
- · agricultural supplies

- washroom facilities in schools and displacement camps
- hygiene and dignity kits for adolescents and families
- drinking water through water trucking and water treatment units
- household and community latrines
- water storage tanks and water treatment
- · training on healthy hygiene practices
- menstrual hygiene awareness sessions

- · emergency tents and winterization kits
- · semi-permanent shelters

- psychological support for affected families
- · group-based psycho-social support activities

WEATHERING THE STORM

He lost his house and his land when the torrential rainfall inundated his village. Muhammad Tauqeer, a 35-year-old local farmer, lives with his family in one of the districts in Pakistan hardesthit by the historic flooding.

Since then, he has been working as a daily wageworker, as his mother, three brothers, and sister all depend on his income.

Thankfully, Islamic Relief provided emergency assistance in the form of cash grants, food supplements, hygiene kits, and psychological support in his community.

The assistance will enable Muhammad's family to meet their basic needs, while they continue to work to rebuild their lives.





The second wave of COVID-19 that unfurled across India in April and May 2021 was devastating. The death toll spiked as oxygen supplies ran out and hospitals were overwhelmed, lockdowns deprived families of essential income-generating activities, and the lack of COVID-19 information and access to vaccines, especially in rural areas, worsened the crisis.

The Humanitarian Coalition ran a joint appeal for India from May 4 – June 2, 2021, for a combined total of \$3.2 million. Our members responded to the crisis across Anantapur District, Penukonda Block, and Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Bihar, Rajasthan, Gujarat, West Bengal, Odisha, Delhi, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand States. We supported the health-care system with oxygen, ventilators, field hospitals and PPE, promoted COVID vaccination and safe hygiene practices, and ensured food security and basic survival for vulnerable families until April 2022.

SURVIVING THE WAVE

Satyabhama Giri and her husband supported their children and parents by selling the fish they caught in a nearby river at a local market.

Unfortunately, both of them were infected with the coronavirus during the deadly second wave in India. Her husband was hospitalized, while Satyabhama was quarantined at home.

They both recovered but were unable to continue fishing due to ongoing post-COVID-19 symptoms such as weakness, lack of energy, and joint pain.

Through the Humanitarian Coalition, **Plan International** responded swiftly to provide emergency food assistance to people impacted by COVID-19 in their community.

"I never thought of getting this support during this crisis and I extend my heartfelt thanks to Plan India for providing rations," says Satyabhama.




On 14 August 2021, a 7.2 magnitude earthquake hit the southwestern region of Haiti causing loss of lives and significant damage to infrastructure, particularly across the three most-affected departments, Grand'Anse, Nippes and Sud. Three days later, Hurricane Grace swept through the country with strong winds and rain, adding to the severe damage. It is estimated that the death toll surpassed 2,200 people, with more than 12,200 injured. Close to 800,000 people were affected.

To respond to the needs that arose following the earthquake and hurricane, the Humanitarian

Coalition ran a national appeal from August 16 to September 3, raising \$5.15 million, including a \$2 million matching fund from the Government of Canada.

The generosity of Canadians enabled 11 Humanitarian Coalition member organizations, together with their local partners, to respond to the humanitarian needs in the aftermath of the earthquake up until May 2022. We have provided assistance, including shelter, water and hygiene, household necessities, food security, health care and protection for 259.196 people.





No matter the cause or scale of the disaster, it is increasingly common for our members to transfer money directly to people who require assistance. Why is this so?

Cash transfers can be an effective short- or longterm response option that helps people meet their essential needs – in the way they choose – while also supporting local producers. Cash is often used to cover emergency food, household, shelter, or medical needs, or to preserve livelihoods. It can fill an income gap in the aftermath of a disaster or between harvests in a situation of chronic food crisis.

Having the necessary funds to ensure their survival helps families avoid detrimental coping strategies, such as selling household assets, eating seeds, or even sending their children to work or marry. In this way, short-term cash transfers help prevent further loss and make it easier for families to recover.

ONGOING DISASTER RESPONSE

Natural disasters are frequent, often under-reported, and devastating. We are witnessing an increase in their intensity, scope and impact. They may not be newsworthy, but these "small" disasters are big enough to overwhelm a country's response capacity.

When that happens, the member agencies of the Humanitarian Coalition, through their presence and international networks, are able to respond quickly to the emergency needs of affected communities. With support from the Canadian government through the Canadian Humanitarian Assistance Fund, along with funding from donors, we provide shelter, water, sanitation, health care, and financial support so that households and communities can recover and build back better.

EARTHQUAKE, PAKISTAN

A 5.9 magnitude earthquake struck southwest Pakistan in October. Homes were destroyed, water systems were damaged and health centres faced increased injuries and illness. Islamic Relief Canada distributed shelter kits, repaired water systems and sanitation facilities, and conducted hygiene training sessions.

Bakhtavar Bibi, a 60-year-old widow, remembers the day the earthquake severely damaged her house. Islamic Relief provided her with building materials so she could make repairs. "Thanks to Almighty Allah, that enabled Islamic Relief to help me," she said.

TYPHOON ODETTE, PHILIPPINES

In mid-December, super Typhoon Odette (also known as "Rai") swept across the Philippines, bringing high winds, torrential rains and landslides. **Oxfam Canada** provided cash assistance to families, repaired water systems, and provided water treatment and storage supplies to affected households.

"Odette was a monster typhoon," says 48-year-old Belen Ga from the Philippines. "The howling winds leveled all the houses in our neighbourhood."


Ga, who lives alone in a shanty town close to the shorelines, fled to an evacuation centre with her neighbours, carrying only a change of clothes and a bit of food.


A few days later, Oxfam's local partner began providing cash grants so that people could buy food and other necessities.

Ga says the money supported her for weeks.

She was even able to buy the ingredients to resume her home-based hotcake business.

And that's good news not only for Ga, but for the children who pass by every day to buy her hotcakes!





TYPHOON ODETTE, PHILIPPINES

An estimated 2.4 million people were impacted by Typhoon Odette. Some of the most urgent needs included potable water, food, hygiene supplies, health care and emergency shelter. **Plan International Canada** provided cash for food, and personal hygiene supplies and information for women and girls.

Typhoon Odette flattened their house and deprived them of water and electricity. But 19-year-old Evangeline says that with the support of Plan International, her family is slowly recovering and she can now make plans to finish her education.

CYCLONE ANA, MALAWI

Tropical storm Ana triggered torrential rains, damaging houses, bridges, roads and schools. Thousands of people were displaced to temporary camps. Plan International Canada provided hygiene kits, shelter support, and protection to affected communities.

Mary and her five children lost their home in Tropical Storm Ana and took refuge in a camp. Plan International Canada provided her family with building supplies and household items. "I am very grateful for the assistance... I am able to rebuild my house," she says.

FEBRUARY - OCTOBER 2022

NEW LIFE FROM THE ASHES

Maile, like most of the men on the island of Tongatapu in the Kingdom of Tonga, is a farmer and plantation worker. "Our household depends on income from the plantation. I sell crops at the market to meet our needs."

He says that after the volcano eruption and acid rain, he went to see his yam crops.

"I felt devastated when I saw the damage to our plantation," says Maile.

CARE Canada's local partner helped the farmers plough the land and install fencing. They supported womens' vegetable gardens, and women farmers received seeds, tools and fruit tree kits.

"There wouldn't have been any other way for my family to have had this blessing," says Maile.

VOLCANO, TONGA

An underwater volcano erupted in January 2022, blanketing Tonga with ash and triggering tsunami waves, leaving many islands inundated and infrastructure severely damaged. CARE Canada provided an emergency water supply, rehabilitated gardens, and supported psychological well-being.

CYCLONE ANA, **MALAWI**

Tropical storm Ana made landfall in Mozambique and southern Malawi in late January 2022, causing destruction of houses and infrastructure, loss of livestock, flooding of crops and contamination of water sources. **World Vision** provided clean water, sanitation, and hygiene and household articles.

THE END OF HIS WATER WOES

Even though 12-year-old aspiring doctor Tonnex Dailesi wakes up early to get ready for school, collecting water from a far-away borehole or a polluted river slows him down.

To address water and sanitation needs after tropical storm Ana hit Malawi, World Vision began rehabilitating and drilling boreholes, including one right next to Tonnex's home.

"I am very happy that soon we will be able to easily access safe water next to our house. This means I will no longer be reporting late for school," says Tonnex.

MAY - NOVEMBER 2022

CYCLONE AGATON, PHILIPPINES

Tropical cyclone Agaton (also known as Megi) brought heavy rainfall to the Philippines in April, causing flooding and landslides that affected more than 2 million people. **Islamic Relief** provided safe water, hygiene supplies, sleeping mats and cash for basic necessities to people who had lost their homes.

When tropical storm Agaton swept through their community, Velma and her family lost their home, their livelihood, and even loved ones. Thanks to Islamic Relief, the family has received what it needs to survive and start rebuilding their lives.

FLOODING, BANGLADESH

Heavy rainfall in northeastern Bangladesh and India in May led to the Surma and Kusiara rivers overflowing. Almost 500,000 people were affected, and many were forced to leave their homes. Islamic Relief provided cash grants, clean water, hygiene kits and shelter materials to affected families.

Rahima Begum says the flooding "devoured her house," leaving her and her three children in a very vulnerable situation. Islamic Relief provided building supplies and cash for labour costs to rebuild her home. "I am very thankful," she says.

FLOODING, BANGLADESH

Flooding in Bangladesh damaged crops, summer vegetation, tube wells, and toilets. Some 1.5 million children were at risk of waterborne diseases, drowning, and malnutrition. Oxfam Canada provided cash grants, rehabilitated wells and built emergency latrines, and distributed hygiene supplies.

Yeasman Akter, her husband and three children lost all their belongings, their goats and their livelihoods when flash floods swept through their community. With cash support from Oxfam Canada, they were able to buy the food they needed to survive, and a goat for future security.



ACCOUNTABILITY

The Humanitarian Coalition members regularly report on their progress in effectively using funds raised from individuals, corporations and the Canadian government, and may be subject at any time to third-party evaluations.

INTERNATIONAL COLLABORATION

The Humanitarian Coalition is also the Canadian representative of the Emergency Appeals Alliance, which is made up of similar collaborative fundraising coalitions from 10 countries.

INTEGRITY

Our member agencies abide by the Core Humanitarian Standards, the Code of Conduct for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) in Disaster Relief, the Cooperation Canada Code of Ethics and Operational Standards as well as the Cooperation Canada Leaders' Pledge on Preventing and Addressing Sexual Misconduct. In addition, the Humanitarian Coalition is accredited by Imagine Canada's Standards Program and the Better Business Bureau.

COST EFFECTIVENESS

In 2022, we allocated more than 94% of our revenues to programs. Core operating costs of the Humanitarian Coalition, such as staff salaries and office expenses, are supported mainly by the annual contributions of our member agencies.
