A MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CO-CHAIRS

When war broke out in Lebanon, Khadijah's home was damaged in the bombing.

The mother of three tried her best to fix what she could with her limited resources. With winter approaching, Khadijah knew she couldn't do it alone.

Through her local municipality, she learned about supports available at a community centre, including winter kits filled with warm clothing, thick blankets and other essentials.

For the first time in months, Khadijah felt a sense of relief. It meant the world to her to know that someone out there was thinking about her family and had reached out to help.

Khadijah's story is one of thousands made possible because Canadians chose to act together. It reflects the purpose of the Humanitarian Coalition: that by responding collectively, we can reach more people, faster, when disasters strike.

Few years have tested the world quite like 2025, which brought extraordinary humanitarian need. Sudan endured the world's largest humanitarian crisis. A devastating earthquake struck Myanmar. Families in Gaza and Lebanon faced relentless bombardment, mass displacement and catastrophic hunger. At the same time, unprecedented reductions in global humanitarian funding stretched the international response. Through it all, our 12 member organizations — and, more importantly, you — came together.

At a time when the world can feel increasingly divided, the Humanitarian Coalition continues to demonstrate the power of coming together in shared purpose.

The Humanitarian Coalition was built on that premise: when a family loses everything to a flood,

an earthquake, or a conflict, the response should be collective and coordinated. That's what has united us for more than two decades — our shared purpose and clear eyes to see that none of us can do it alone.

Together with your support, our member organizations combined their expertise and reach last year to deliver emergency food in Gaza, Lebanon and Sudan, restore access to clean water after Afghanistan's earthquake, and provide emergency cash assistance to families in Haiti following Hurricane Melissa.

Looking ahead to 2026, we know the needs will not shrink. But we also know that our coalition commitment — pooling expertise, mobilizing quickly in times of crisis, and ensuring we make the most of every donation — means we are ready to respond to the complexity of today's world because our model was deliberately designed for exactly this purpose.

We are grateful to be doing this work alongside you. Your generosity is what allows our 12 organizations to respond as one when disaster strikes.

As Co-Chairs, we've seen firsthand the commitment of our members to work together in service of people affected by crisis. That spirit of collaboration has never been more important.

Thank you for supporting us in 2025. We hope you'll continue to stand with us in 2026.

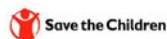

OUR IMPACT IN NUMBERS: 2025 IN REVIEW

In 2025, the Humanitarian Coalition proved there is more that unites than divides us. With your support and in partnership with the Government of Canada, we reached people in some of the world's most overlooked and urgent situations: together.

Major Emergencies

We continued to respond to **three large-scale humanitarian crises**:

LEBANON EMERGENCY

285,973 people assisted through funding from the Lebanon Appeal, which was launched in November 2024.

GAZA EMERGENCY

More than **50,000** people reached as part of our ongoing response to the crisis in Gaza and the West Bank.

SUDAN EMERGENCY

\$1.2 million allocated to Humanitarian Coalition members to **support life-saving humanitarian assistance** in Sudan.

Data on number of participants reached was not yet available at the time of publication.

Beyond the Headlines

We responded to **10 additional disasters in 9 countries**, including Myanmar, the Philippines, and Haiti. We delivered life-saving aid to families affected by:



4 storms



3 earthquakes



3 floods

\$5.76 million raised to respond to under-reported emergencies, including Government of Canada funds leveraged through the Canadian Humanitarian Assistance Fund.

209,317 people affected by these lesser-known crises were reached with emergency aid.

Our History

In the wake of the Indian Ocean Tsunami in 2004, leading aid organizations saw a need to improve how Canadians could respond to major humanitarian disasters. The Humanitarian Coalition began in early 2005 as an informal collaboration among CARE Canada, Oxfam Canada, Oxfam-Québec and Save the Children. Plan International Canada joined soon after.

The Humanitarian Coalition was formally incorporated in 2009. We expanded our membership in 2017 with the addition of Canadian Lutheran World Relief and Islamic Relief Canada. In 2019, Canadian Foodgrains Bank and World Vision Canada joined as full members, along with Action Against Hunger, Humanity & Inclusion and Doctors of the World as affiliate members.

WHY WE EXIST

Humanitarian aid is more critical than ever before.

Across the globe, 239 million people urgently need humanitarian assistance and protection. Crises are growing more severe and complex, fueled by climate shocks, conflict, displacement and rising hunger. Countless emergencies unfold in silence, never reaching the headlines.

Yet, as humanitarian needs soar, international aid fell by 20% in 2025 compared to 2024—the steepest drop ever recorded. Donor countries reassessed their commitments just as the scale and severity of global crises demand greater support, not less.

In these challenging times, the collective work of the Humanitarian Coalition and the generosity of our donors are truly indispensable. Together,

we deliver life-saving aid to families facing both large-scale emergencies and smaller, under-reported disasters.

Our Collective Impact

In 2025, the Humanitarian Coalition responded to 13 emergencies, reaching more than 545,000 people. Thanks to support from the Government of Canada and Canadians, we raised more than \$7.4 million to address urgent humanitarian needs around the world and help communities recover from disaster.

Since 2009, the Humanitarian Coalition has raised more than \$267 million to meet the emergency needs of an estimated 13.3 million people affected by 162 crises. Together, we have a proven track record of helping survivors of disasters rebuild their lives quickly, effectively and with dignity.

4 BENEFITS OF WORKING TOGETHER

The Humanitarian Coalition offers a unique combination of scale, speed, impact and integrity. Through active public engagement and communications, we reach up to 18 million Canadians and are supported by more than 2.5 million donors.

1. Greater Effectiveness

During humanitarian emergencies, we provide direct access to disaster and response information, coordinate spokespersons, share resources and collaborate to update Canadians in the most effective manner.

2. Reduced Competition

By working together and pooling resources, the emphasis shifts away from competing priorities toward shared goals, delivering the most effective humanitarian response possible.

3. Lower Fundraising Costs

A joint appeal allows us to collectively devote a higher percentage of donated funds to relief activities, rather than running competing fundraising campaigns.

4. Increased Awareness and Accountability

By joining forces, our organizations can further raise awareness of disasters and humanitarian needs while strengthening accountability to one another and to the public.

8 REASONS TO SUPPORT THE HUMANITARIAN COALITION

1. 12 members active in 160 countries

With extensive geographic coverage of programs in 160 countries, our 12 members and their local partners are uniquely positioned to respond quickly with humanitarian aid.

2. Mutual trust and transparency

We maintain strong relationships with each of our member organizations, having built an understanding of their capacities in humanitarian response and established mutual trust, transparency and professionalism.

3. Unparalleled connection to 18 million Canadians

Our members work across the humanitarian, development and peace-building nexus, with combined annual operations exceeding \$1.1 billion. As a collective, we reach up to 18 million Canadians.

4. Proven partnership record with the Government of Canada

All our member organizations hold current approved institutional profiles with Global Affairs Canada and have a proven track record of partnering with the Government of Canada to deliver effective and timely emergency responses.

5. Commitment to humanitarian program quality standards

Our members continue to demonstrate their commitment to meeting the highest standards in

their programs. Humanitarian Coalition membership requires adherence to the Core Humanitarian Standard and the Code of Conduct for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and Non-Governmental Organizations in Disaster Relief.

6. Proven public record of accountability

We have a proven track record of accountability and transparency in managing humanitarian program funding. Initially formed in 2005, members incorporated the Humanitarian Coalition as an independent legal entity in 2009.

7. Rapid decision-making

Unparalleled in Canada, the Humanitarian Coalition has negotiated and documented agreements among members, enabling rapid decision-making and coordination to improve the quality and quantity of humanitarian responses.

8. Strong commitment to localization

We fully support partnership models that contribute to capacity building, local ownership of project outcomes and empowerment of communities affected by disasters. Currently, at least 50 percent of Humanitarian Coalition-supported projects are delivered with or through local partners.



LEBANON EMERGENCY RESPONSE



In the fall of 2024, military operations led to a humanitarian emergency in Lebanon. More than 3,100 people were killed and more than one million were displaced. Despite ceasefire announcements, hostilities in Lebanon continued, deepening the humanitarian crisis in 2025.

Our Shared Impact

In 2024, the Humanitarian Coalition ran a national fundraising campaign to support relief efforts in Lebanon. Our response continued in 2025, and with long-standing local partnerships, our members were able to adapt to the changing context to meet the needs of children and families. Together, all 12 members of the Humanitarian Coalition delivered a coordinated response reaching 285,973 people — 52% of whom are women and girls.

With your support and in partnership with the Government of Canada, the Humanitarian Coalition members provided:

- › Emergency food and food vouchers
- › Cash-for-shelter assistance for households facing heightened risks

- › Dignity kits for women and girls
- › Water, Sanitation and Hygiene facilities (latrines, showers and handwashing stations)
- › Winterization support (blankets, hats, scarves, gloves and vouchers to cover the cost of fuel for heating)
- › Hygiene kits, baby kits and kitchen supplies
- › Health care services and medical equipment
- › Nutrition screening and therapeutic foods for children under five
- › Psychosocial support and mental health care
- › Rehabilitation and assistive devices for persons with disabilities

Key Challenges

Ongoing military attacks, repeated displacement, and a deepening economic crisis continue to affect millions of people across Lebanon, with many families struggling to afford food and access basic services. Your support is vital as we work with communities to help them meet their immediate needs and work towards longer-term stability.

LANA'S STORY: EDUCATION IS ESSENTIAL

When the Syrian civil war started in 2011, Fatouma had a toddler named Lana and had just given birth to her second child. While the border was still open, Fatouma and her family fled to Lebanon.

After 12 years in Lebanon and three more children, the family still lived in a tent and struggled to make ends meet. For Lana and her sisters, a nearby child-friendly space has been a source of joy during difficult times.

“My daughters are very happy when they go there,” Fatouma said. ***“I can also relax, because I know they are in a safe place, learning good and important things.”***

When hostilities escalated across Lebanon's southern border in 2023, education was put

on hold. A bomb hit a nearby building, and Fatouma's tent started to burn with her family still inside. The family escaped, but they lost their home, their savings and all their belongings. The conflict escalated again in September 2024.

In 2024 and 2025, with support from Canadian Foodgrains Bank and the Humanitarian Coalition, a local church helped Fatouma's family rebuild their tent, furnish it and buy essentials like rice and cooking oil. When the church reopened their education centre after the ceasefire, Lana begged to go.

“She loves to learn,” Fatouma said. ***“This is home to her.”***

STEPPING UP IN TIMES OF UNPRECEDENTED CRISIS

In 2025, famines were confirmed in parts of Gaza and Sudan. In response to these devastating crises, the Humanitarian Coalition allocated \$1.5 million in new humanitarian assistance for Sudan, Gaza and the West Bank. This funding allowed our members to provide critical food, safe water and sanitation support, emergency health services, cash assistance and mental health support to families who needed it most.

Complex and protracted crises like these require that we stand together to uphold international humanitarian law and ensure unhindered humanitarian access for the millions of people in urgent need of humanitarian assistance.

One Mile More

On October 29, 2025, Amanda's One Mile More Challenge turned a personal milestone into meaningful support for people in Gaza. She chose to run the Toronto Waterfront Marathon, a 42.2 km journey, which is one mile more than the entire length of Gaza.

This was Amanda's first marathon, and she dedicated it to raising awareness and funds for the Humanitarian Coalition's humanitarian response in Gaza. By running the Toronto Waterfront Marathon and inviting others to give, she showed how one person's commitment can bring people together around a shared cause.

When we asked Amanda what inspired her to run for this cause, she said, *"We can go farther together."* We couldn't agree more.

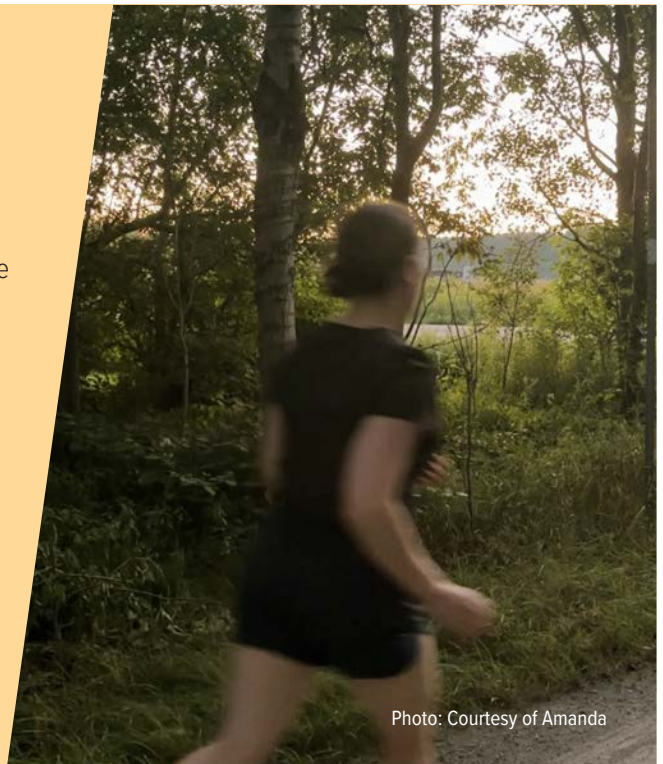

GAZA EMERGENCY



More than two years of bombings and attacks have decimated Gaza, resulting in a massive humanitarian crisis. Humanitarian needs are also growing in the West Bank as forced displacement and settler violence continue to escalate.

OUR SHARED IMPACT

With your support and in partnership with member organizations, funding from the Humanitarian Coalition has expanded the life-saving work of local partners in Gaza and the West Bank. In 2025, this included more than \$458,000 for:

- emergency cash assistance
- safe water distribution
- food distribution

KEY CHALLENGES

In Gaza, challenges continue to be military violence and insecurity, movement restrictions, fuel shortages, and obstructions to aid delivery. Despite the extremely challenging humanitarian and security situation, our members have been actively responding to this crisis — many have been addressing humanitarian needs in Gaza and the West Bank for decades.

Where We Stand

The Humanitarian Coalition is deeply alarmed by the continued violence and the devastating impact on civilians in Gaza and the West Bank. We reiterate our urgent call for all parties to establish a permanent ceasefire and work towards a permanent, just and lasting peace.

Additionally, we call for unfettered and safe humanitarian access, the release of all unjustly detained people, and the upholding of international humanitarian law. Even in the face of active conflict, we remain steadfast in our commitment to the four core principles of humanitarian action:

- › **Humanity** – Human suffering must be addressed wherever it is found. The purpose of aid is to protect life and health and ensure respect for human beings.
- › **Neutrality** – Humanitarian actors must not take sides in a conflict or get involved in political or ideological disputes, so the focus stays on providing aid where it is most needed.
- › **Impartiality** – Aid must be provided to those most in need, regardless of nationality, race, gender, religious belief, class or political opinions.
- › **Independence** – Aid must remain separate from political, economic or military agendas, so it can be given based only on the principles of humanity, neutrality and impartiality.

As we respond to the immense needs in Gaza and beyond, these principles guide every action we take.

HUNGER CRISIS IN SUDAN AND SURROUNDING REGION



Sudan is facing the world's worst hunger and displacement crisis. Driven by conflict and climate shocks, outbreaks of cholera, malaria and measles continue to rise in areas where health, water and sanitation systems have collapsed, while acute malnutrition rates are alarmingly high among children.

Our Shared Impact

With your support, the Humanitarian Coalition allocated \$1.2 million for life-saving projects in the region for:

- emergency food and food vouchers
- emergency cash assistance
- water trucking and well rehabilitation
- health services
- psychosocial support and mental health care

Key Challenges

As families are forced from their homes in search of food and safety, a growing displacement crisis is spreading across neighbouring countries. Ongoing sustainable support for Sudan is critical to help meet urgent needs and work towards longer-term stability. Our members are active across the region and will continue to respond to this crisis.



RESPONDING TO UNDER-REPORTED EMERGENCIES

In 2025, Humanitarian Coalition members responded to 10 emergencies across nine countries through the Canadian Humanitarian Assistance Fund (CHAF). These crises affected tens of thousands of people, disrupting their access to basic essentials like food, shelter, safe water and health services.

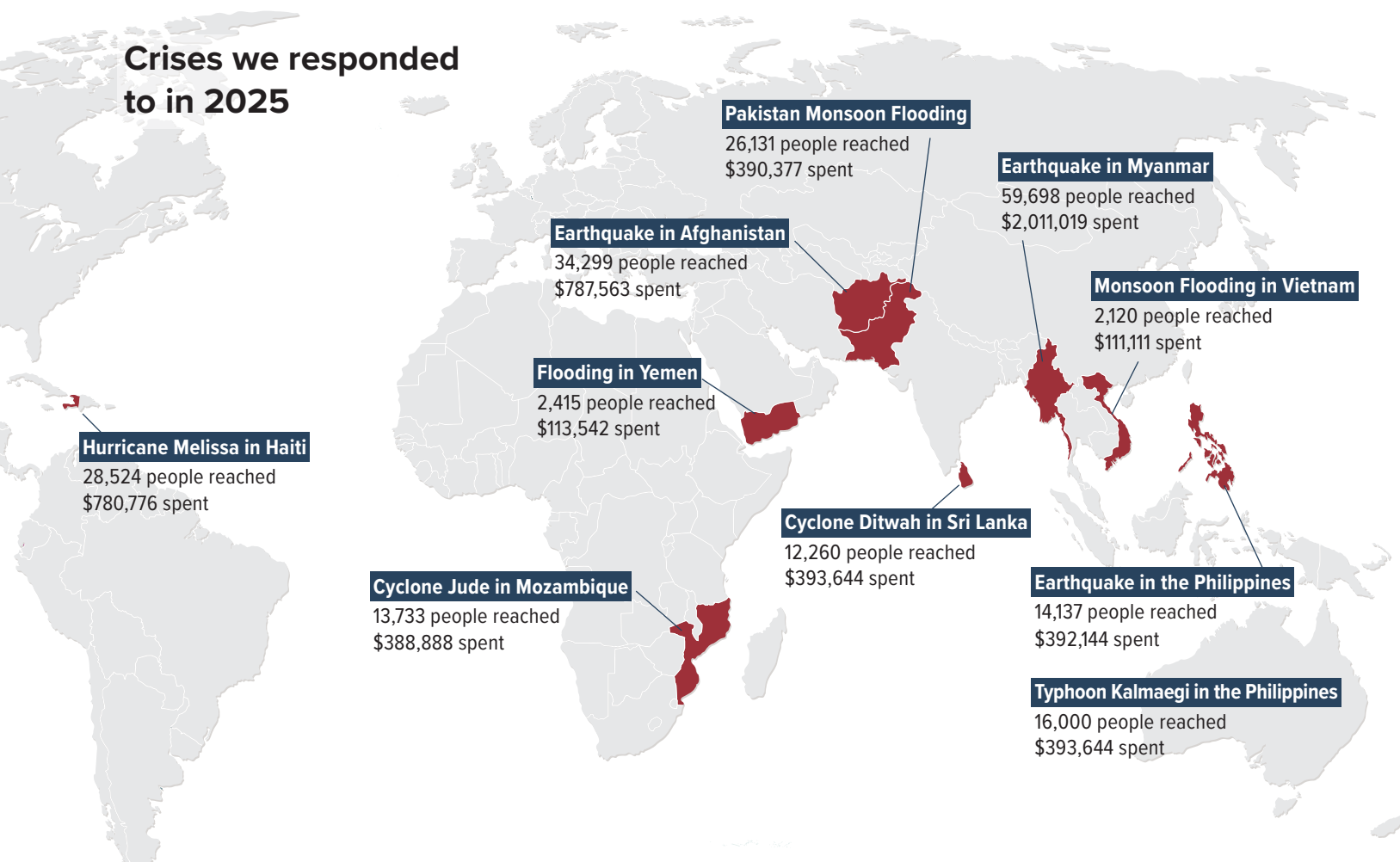
Through the Fund, both the Government of Canada and Humanitarian Coalition supporters are making a tangible difference for families across the globe. Humanitarian Coalition members reached more than 209,000 people with clean water, sanitation and hygiene supplies, alongside shelter, cash assistance and protection. And in the process, our efforts helped prevent disease, restore dignity, and

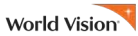
bring immediate relief to communities facing the devastating convergence of climate shocks, conflict, and displacement.

CHAF was created in 2014 to help Humanitarian Coalition members respond quickly and effectively to lesser-known international disasters. Funded by the Government of Canada with additional support from public donations, CHAF delivers fast, life-saving support in emergencies around the globe—providing food, shelter, clean water and health services to more than 2.4 million people since 2014.

REBUILDING WITH CHOICE: NYEIN NYEIN'S PATH TO RECOVERY

Nyein Nyein was having lunch with her daughters on March 28, 2025, when an earthquake struck her village in Myanmar. *"The shaking was so intense, I felt completely stunned. Then my husband shouted, 'It's an earthquake!' We quickly grabbed our daughters and rushed outside,"* Nyein Nyein remembered.

As Nyein Nyein's family escaped their home, they struggled to keep their footing as their belongings fell and shattered around them. *"Our drinking water pots had broken, and we had to wade through the spilled water on our way out. The loud crashing sounds of utensils and cookware were overwhelming,"* she recalled.

"When we checked our house, we saw cracked walls and bricks hanging loose. Seeing all the destruction, we were completely overwhelmed, we didn't even know what to do."

To keep her family safe in case another earthquake struck, Nyein Nyein decided they would not sleep inside their damaged home. The family spent a week sleeping outside before moving a wooden bed to the front of the house. *"We only returned indoors recently because of winds and rain,"* she stated.

With support from the Government of Canada's Canadian Humanitarian Assistance Fund, World Vision and the Humanitarian Coalition, Nyein Nyein's family received 360,000 kyats (about \$150) in cash assistance, allowing them to decide how best to meet their immediate needs.

After learning that aftershocks could follow the earthquake, Nyein Nyein decided to delay repairs and prioritize food. *"I used the money to buy essential items for the copy shop and also spent part of it to provide food for my family."* Nyein Nyein manages a copy shop from her house.

"Since our expenses were greater than our income, this support made a real difference for us," she stated.

A NOTE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This year tested the humanitarian sector in profound ways with shrinking funding and escalating emergencies due to both climate change and ongoing conflict. But hope prevailed. Our donors from coast to coast to coast stepped up with unprecedented support and our members continued to respond to emergencies with unwavering resolve to reach children and families in crises.

This Annual Report reaffirms who we are: **12 organizations with expertise in a variety of sectors, and 12 networks of local partners in 160 countries — united by one mission. 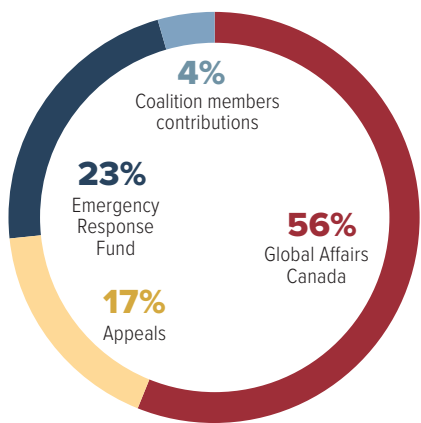
